HAYDEN LAKE, IDAHO

1. *The Cast @ Blast ~ 1998*

This rustic log shop located in the town of Hayden Lake used to be THE spot for bait, lures, rods, shells - and every possible gift item for the outdoor sports enthusiast. I painted my sisters, Peggy, Marilee and myself in full fly-fishing gear - from vests to boots - in front of the "Cast & Blast." We were ready to take on Lake Hayden! Sadly for all its customers, a short time after I painted this piece, this picturesque store closed for business. Its owners retired to enjoy all of the fun outdoor sports that their mercantile had supported for years. Rumor has it that they're fly-fishing as we speak at some pristine setting in North Idaho!

2. *The Century ~ 1987*

This handsome wood boat was my father's pride and joy for years at our cabin on Hayden Lake, Idaho. Built of mahogany with an interior of crimson red, this inboard "Resorter" knew how to move! Waving from the steering wheel with his pal, Chum, is my youngest brother, Bob. Not only did he love driving as much as my dad did, he spent countless hours slalom skiing behind her. This painting was completed as a college graduation gift for Bob, who is its current owner.

3. *Clark House Country Inn ~ 1994*

This stately mansion is located on a hill overlooking Hayden Lake. Its history is shrouded in mystery, as little is known about her original owners except that the Clarks were very wealthy, and designed their magnificent home at the turn of the century. Mr. Clark disappeared under rather sinister circumstances, leaving his wife ill prepared to deal with the future. The mansion was bought and sold a number of times, abused and saved over the decades. Luckily for her, a couple fell in love with her and meticulously restored her to her former glory. My brother, Bill, his wife, Jorja, my mother, Sally, and I are pictured, about to enjoy lunch on the lawn.

August often brings an overflow of friends and family to the cabin shared by my mother and youngest brother's family, so Doug and I decided to rent from Linda and Clark Richards who own this cabin a few lots down the beach. 6. *The Lake Cabin ~ 1977*

This was my first attempt at painting what seemed like my "real" home - our family cabin on Sunset Beach. My mother, Sally Simpson, owns the original painting, and it is still hanging in her bedroom in the cabin. My parents bought this property in 1956. Our family spent 1957 and 1958 camping in a huge army tent with a cooking lean-to located directly in the teeth of the wind (my mother was "trooper"). It had wooden floor - complete with several skunks that like to hide beneath it. The cabin was finally completed in 1958, and became my parent's ongoing "summer project" for years. My mother commandeered us kids, and together we built a beautiful lake-rock retaining wall around the cabin. It's still doing its job - sixty years later!
